PRESCRIPTIONS

We always describe General Practice as being like an iceberg, with the appointments above the surface- and a huge raft of other things going on underneath, which is less visible. One of those "under the surface "things like prescribing- a task which we estimate takes the equivalent of 1 GP's a week to manage.

We issue approximately 800 prescriptions per week and these are a mixture of repeat prescriptions and special/acute medication requests.


You can help us manage our prescribing workload by:

- 1- Order online via our website or via the NHS App. Ordering your medication online helps us to process prescriptions more quickly and easily identify what date requests were made. It also means that you can add a note about your medication request for example if you are ordering early due to go on holiday.
- 2- Allowing enough time when you order. Please allow up to 5 working days for us to process repeat prescriptions, and 10 working days for acute medication requests
